A Word From the Governor...

Why.

(You thought I was kidding, didn't you, when I titled this "A Word..."?)

For those clubs I have already had the privilege of visiting, they know what this means and **why** I place so much value on it. For those of you I have yet to visit, allow me to explain:

Rotary frequently comes up in conversation with our friends, family, or acquaintances. Perhaps we are wearing a Rotary pin or shirt, or perhaps someone notices we are raising funds for a Rotary project. When that happens, we are often asked "What is Rotary"? And most of us fail to give a cogent response because we are too caught with explaining the "How" of Rotary instead of the "Why". Consider this example:

Friend: So, what is Rotary?

Rotarian: Well, we meet every Thursday morning at the local mosque, and we listen to a speaker and maybe talk about a project...



Does this sound familiar? It certainly does to me. I spent the first three years of being a Rotarian explaining the "How" of Rotary instead of the "Why". Specifically, I failed to explain

- Why I joined Rotary;
- Why I stayed a member of Rotary;
- Why Rotary means so much to me; or
- **Why** Rotary is so critical to our world at this time.

When people ask about Rotary, they are rarely seeking a breakdown of the moral, temporal, and financial obligations of membership – that comes later. Instead, most people want to know your story - **why** does Rotary matter to you?

For this reason, I encourage all of you to know your **why** – **why** you joined, **why** you've stayed, and **why** you value Rotary in your life. And once you know your **why**, share it with those around you. It's one word, but it has an enormous impact.
